In 2016, the <u>United States Department of Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (DOJ</u> <u>COPS</u>) awarded a Community Policing Development (CPD) grant to the <u>National Association for Civilian</u> <u>Oversight of Law Enforcement (NACOLE)</u>. NACOLE sought to provide comprehensive guidance on civilian oversight for oversight practitioners, law enforcement, community organizations, and local officials in order to further develop effective civilian oversight throughout the United States.
