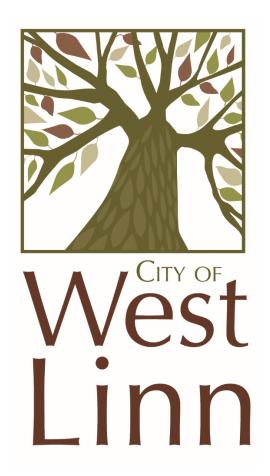

2020 Accomplishments

- Successfully worked with City Council to update pertinent sections of West Linn Code regulating Percent for Art Program (2.200)
- Drafted guidelines for identifying, recruiting, and selecting artworks and artists as part of Percent for Arts program
- Began forging connections with other local groups, including WLHS Arts Department, Historic Willamette Main Street
- Purchased signage for Katy McFadden's "The Gathering" sculpture installation at West Linn Library (using funds donated for that purpose) and oversaw installation

2020 Challenges

2020 Accomplishments

- Resolved the long-standing and frustrating problem with MailChimp emails sent to BNA members ending in spam by converting our email system to Google Mail.
- Amended the BNA by-laws to add a Treasurer position. Nominated and elected Walt Swan as BNA Treasurer.
- Reorganized our meeting structure to deal with Covid-19 restrictions and purchased a month-to-month Zoom license for \$14.99 per month.
- Reviewed a presentation of WLWV School District planned expansion of West Linn High School parking and stadium expansion by Andrew Tull, 3J Consulting and his team.
- Between August and Octobers provided the opportunity for twelve candidates for public office to make presentations. These included candidates for state representative, West Linn Mayor and City Council.
- Reviewed a presentation of the school lunch program available during Covid-19.
- Matt Grady of Gramor Development presented their plans for a new 5,000 sq. ft. Post
 Office, or retail office space at the site of the existing post office. There was unanimous
 support for aligning the parking with Market of Choice and building a new retail post
 office at the site.
- Lance Calvert, Director Public Works, presented the challenges to improve traffic flow in Central Village that would better accommodate new and proposed developments at 1575 Burns Street, and the post office. This will be a continuing conversation.
- David Aaron Shelofsky, and partners presented their plans to develop and build an office building at 22150 Willamette Drive.
- Continued conversation with the City staff and the West Linn Collaborative on the extent of support for, and the possible uses for the Old Bolton Fire Station.
- Began the design of a new Walking Tour Booklet and App that would encourage neighbors, and their children to become more engaged in the community.

- Jessica Bull, JLA Public Involvement, reviewed ODOT plans for I205 and tolling.
- Daniel'le DeVoss, City *Associate Engineer*, outlined current status of Safe Routes to School, and plans for next year.
- Continued to explore solutions to the parking problems at the high school.
- Continued to support the restoration of Burnside Park, Maddax Woods and the McLean House.
- Continued to refine meeting norms that encourage listening, collaboration and the involvement to improve our collaboration and problem solving efficiency.
- Continued to advocate for the development of the new post office in Central Village by working with Gramor Development, and the City Council.
- Hosted and facilitated discussions on issues of community importance, such as the proposed City Charter Amendment, West Linn Wilsonville bond measure, and proposed developments for Central Village, and 1575 Burns Street.

2020 Challenges

- A reliable means of communicating with our members and reaching out to potential members.
- Refining and codifying BNA procedures to make it easier for new officers to step in to their positions, such as banking, contacts with the city and TVF&R, facilitating meetings, records retention and working with the Chimpmail system.
- Refining and strengthening "Zoom" meeting norms.
- Adapting to online meetings and broadening membership.

Draft 2021 Goals

- Increase active participation of residents and the business community in the BNA.
- Continue to improve communication with our members through our improved e-mail system, and with the use of social media and the City of West Linn website.
- Continue to support community events such as the Ice Cream Social, the Lighting of Maddax Woods, volunteer efforts to improve trails, the restoration of Maddax Woods, Burnside Park, and the Pocket Park.
- Continue to collaborate with the City, Gramor Development, and USPS on the development and retention of a new post office in Central Village.
- Collaborating with the owners/developers of 1575 Burns St., adjacent property owners and the City's Planning Department to agree on a development that serves the owners, adjacent property owners and is consistent with the Bolton Neighborhood Plan.
- Participate in the planning of the Waterfront Development.
- Continue to work with the West Linn Police Department, neighbors and the West Linn-Wilsonville School District to reduce the parking issues in and around the high school.
- Continue to support the McLean House as a vital part of our neighborhood.

- Update and print a new edition of the Bolton Neighborhood Walking Tour Booklet and link it with a app.
- Collaborate with the West Linn Garden Club to create a memorial for James Weaver in Maddax Woods.
- Continue to be involved with the West Linn Collaborative, Inc. and its proposals to plan a community center at the old Bolton fire station.
- Participate in the design and planning of the proposed middle school on Dollar Street, and the proposed expansion of the high school parking and stadium facilities.

2020 Accomplishments

Prior to the pandemic, crosswalk flags were purchased and intended to be implemented at Pimlico and Santa Anita. Due to the highly contagious nature of Covid-19, these flags have not been put to use yet. Additionally, 4 park benches were funded for 2 parks within NA boundaries; Palomino Park Alice Benski Park. Meeting attendance has been steady to increased, due in part to the ease of attending online. Additionally, we held a candidates forum in October prior to the election, and it was very well attended.

2020 Challenges

Same challenges as the rest of the world. We suspended meetings for a number of months, due in large part to a low need to address NA issues. Reconnecting with neighbors and the NA was a challenge, but by August, people pretty much had the hang of meeting online.

2021 Goals

The NA is meeting on December 15th, so no shared goals have been confirmed as of the time of this report submission. However, on behalf of the NA, I would foresee that increasing attendance and member engagement is high on the list of desired accomplishments for the coming year. If the city council or staff have ideas or recommendations for how to increase engagement, we are listening.

Any additional feedback to share with the City Council?

As you all know, it was a strange year. But I think that in some ways being forced to be separate has, in the smallest way, brought our neighborhood just a little closer together. There are more people interested in local government than I've seen in my 5 years of living here, so I hope to see that continue into 2021. We appreciate the technical support of city staff, and the funding that has allowed us to do a few cool things this year.

Accounting of Neighborhood Association Grant Funds

\$218.66- See Me Crosswalk Flags. Total expense includes item at \$199 and delivery cost. The NA has approved spending up to \$2,800 on park benches, but as of the time of this reporting, expenses have not officially been incurred. The HSNA is working with the West Linn Parks and Rec department to procure and install the benches, and is awaiting the final expense total from them. It is unclear whether these expenses will be incurred in calendar year 2020, but it is clear they will be incurred in FY 20/21. Related- perhaps these reports should coincide with the FY, in order to match the funding cycle.

Meeting Times, Dates & Location -

The Public Safety Advisory Board met in January and February 2020; we adjusted our meeting night to the fourth Wednesday of the month at 6:00PM in the John Satter Community Room at the West LinnPolice Department. The reason for this change was to facilitate greater participation by our Council liaison. We were considering fewer Board meetings and more frequent of smaller sub-committees on topical issues. COVID restrictions prevented us from meeting in person and completing our reorganization. Our city liaison has not been able to share the training needed for online Board meetings. Whenever that guidance is forthcoming, we expect to resume meeting remotely early 2021.

2020 Accomplishments

Promotion of the Map Your Neighborhood preparedness program continued throughout the early part of 2020. At the onset of the pandemic, our MYN Coordinator endeavored to post all the essential information online and presented a live promotion on the West Linn Police Department Facebook page.

2020 Challenges

The COVID lockdown has been the overwhelming challenge for the Board in 2020. We had started plans for both our primary projects, but could not implement them.

2021 Goals

In light of appointment of a new Police Oversight and Accountability Task Force, the future of the Public Safety Advisory Board is uncertain. Much of our charge to review patterns of criminal activity and gauge appropriate response appears to have shifted. In 2019, we also discussed the confusion the public experiences when a traffic safety concern emerges. Is this a function of PSAB or the more interdisciplinary Traffic Safety Committee?

If the City Council determines there remains a need for a citizen advisory group charged with preparedness for disasters, we recommend renaming the group, secure at least 9 citizens to participate and carry forward the following goals we identified for 2020:

- Continue with important board initiatives and outreach:
- Increase Map Your Neighborhood training sessions back to 2018 levels and to make the program available for remote attendance/training.
- Secure additional donors to continue the scholarship program enabling teens from West Linn to participate in Street Survival training.

- Work with TVF&R to raise awareness of actions citizens can take to prevent wildfires.
- Support the City to organize a 2021 Emergency Preparedness Fair
- Work with the Community Relations Coordinator to improve outreach for our established programs.

We met almost every month (at first in person, then using Zoom.)

Continued stewardship of Sahallie Illahee, Ibach, and Wilderness Park

Through the work of members David Kleinke and Bill Wilkins, work removing invasive species continued at these 3 parks. When social distancing requirements and bad weather came, David and Bill adjusted accordingly. We're very happy to see what a great improvement we've made in beating back blackberry, holly and ivy, and that the plantings we've made are doing OK.

Neighborhood Signs Installed

Signs at two locations in the RS neighborhood were installed by the City! We're very grateful for this and the signs look great. Our NA designed them and chose the locations.

Candidate Forums

We held two candidate forums – for City Council, Mayor and State Rep candidates. These were very well attended events and members appreciated being able to hear from the candidates. The events were non-partisan and all candidates were invited to speak.

Speakers/presentations

We invited speakers from "outside" groups including Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, Second Home, The W.L. Sustainability Advisory board, the new City Manager, and others.

Communications

We regularly sent via MailChimp a newsletter to our mailing list subscribers – at least once a month. We also sent emails if something important was happening in the City (pandemic info, post office, the toy drive, etc.) We also kept neighbors on the mailing list AND on Facebook and Nextdoor up-to-date on issues as well.

Abby Farber has attended every NAP meeting; she's the Secretary of the group and keeps the notes. She also participates and shares news of the RSNA as well as bringing news back to the NA.

Filled VP Vacancy

Christopher Groshko agreed to serve as Vice President.

2020 Challenges

Please describe challenges your group faced in 2020.

Attendance at meetings – having to meet by Zoom may possibly have cut attendance down a bit. Except for the Candidate Forums we average between 5-10 people per meeting.

We set some big goals for 2020.....that we did not always meet. Some were due to Covid-19, others that there simply are not enough people involved in the NA. We're proud about what we DID achieve especially the work in the parks and the neighborhood signs....perhaps this level of action is what we should aim for.

2021 Goals

2021 Potential Use of Funds:

Parks beautification – The NA has approved the sponsorship of three park benches at Sahallie Illahee Park and Wilderness Park.

Playground Opening Event – The NA will be involved in planning the celebration of the opening of the new playground at Sahallie Illahee Park. We intend to use funds to help pay for refreshments, signs, and other items that are not in the Parks Department budget.

Other – we have goals for 2021 (see goals section) all of which may incur expenses – printing materials, providing plants, equipment and snacks/refreshments for parks projects and other events. For example, we can fund neighborhood emergency kits for Map Your NeighborhoodWe also want to continue to support efforts such as the Lions Club and other neighborhood HoAs in beautifying their areas. We're also going to do much more outreach to the community – perhaps with more events that have food and activities.

In 2020, the January meeting was held in Bellagio's Pizza on Willamette Falls Drive due to unavailability of our usual meeting location.

Starting in March, our meetings have been held virtually using Zoom. SONA has met six times in 2020.

2020 Accomplishments

SONA recently received our **Firewise certification renewal for 2021**. Some insurance companies give a discount for living in a Firewise certified neighborhood. USAA is an example of a company that gives a discount. Firewise is administered by the National Fire Protection Association (www.nfpa.org).

SONA completed two big projects in 2020:

- The first was the mowing of the tall grasses and invasive species in the 5-6 acres of meadows in the White Oak Savanna (which was done with the generosity of 16 neighbor's donations this year).
- The second project was the filling of the "red box" eight times with a total of about 105 cubic yards of wood fuel removed from the White Oak Savanna Park. This wood came from the naturally felled trees which came down in the numerous windstorms we had during this year.

In addition, we completed the following:

- We had a small group **planting of 47 donated Sword Ferns in the White Oak Savanna** in the Fall done by six girls and their Moms and using the Covid-19 safety protocols.
- We had several families and small groups who planted **250 Camassia quamash bulbs in the Savanna** in the Fall. Covid-19 safety protocols were observed.
- SONA made several presentations to the City Council to advocate for the smaller-scale
 Natural Play Area that children in West Linn have been looking forward to for over three
 years.

 During the year, we hosted several speakers who provided information to our members on community issues. Examples include our new City Manager, West Linn Food Pantry, etc.

2020 Challenges

- Fire break mowing of the White Oak Savanna Park. Despite our efforts to work with the Park Department for mowing of the lower part of the White Oak Savanna, we were unable to convince them to provide the mowing. In the end, we reached out to several neighbors who paid their own money (\$1,200 in all) to have the park mowed.
- Nature Play Area for the White Oak Savanna Park. We found it difficult to work with the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board on the Nature Play Area for the White Oak Savanna Park. Despite our efforts to explain our reasoning for wanting a smaller, more natural, play area, many of the members of PRAB were upset by our request and resisted any changes to the original plan.

2021 Goals

- White Oak Savanna Park Firebreak Mowing. We hope to proactively work with the Parks Department to accomplish the mowing of the lower part of the White Oak Savanna Park as a firebreak.
- Nature Play Area for the White Oak Savanna Park. We look forward to helping finalize the plans for the Nature Play Area and work with the Park Department to begin construction of the Nature Play Area once funds are available.
- Continue informing our members as to citywide issues and any communications from the city.
- Continue hosting speakers to keep our members informed.

2020 Accomplishments

- Completed the addition of Appendix C, "Climate Action Plan Items," of the Sustainable West Linn Strategic Plan.
- Sent a proposal to city council for the hiring of a new sustainability staff person. Current staff cannot handle the sustainability work that needs to be accomplished.
- Explored possible uses of city unimproved right-of-way properties that would require no additional maintenance by the city.
- Began the process of possible city enrollment in the Clackamas County *Leaders in Sustainability* program.
- Completed the SAB 2020 Goals and Tasks document for city council.
- SAB provided input to Jeremiah Kirk on new energy-saving lights in city hall.
- Began work on updating the SAB content on the West Linn city website.
- Explored new ways of providing educational workshops/videos on sustainability issues.
- Proposed the idea of purchasing electric vehicles for the city fleet.

2020 Challenges

- Maintaining a full committee of seven members, and rapid member turnover.
- Several meetings cancelled due to Covid-19 and city technical issues.
- Old Time Fair e-bike event and community education series cancelled due to Covid-19.

2021 Goals

GOAL 1: Continue to lobby for the hiring of a city sustainability staff person. The work that needs to be accomplished in the area of sustainability is far too great to be handled by existing staff.

GOAL 2: Enroll the city in the Columbia-Willamette Clean Cities Coalition, https://www.cwcleancities.org.

GOAL 3: Advocate for enrolling city buildings into the *Leaders in Sustainability* program from Clackamas County, https://www.clackamas.us/recycling/work/getcertified.html. Identify and

prioritize best buildings to start with, and with city council help, begin implementation of the program.

GOAL 4: Work with the city to develop and expand our Sustainability Education Series workshops. The focus should be on easily accessible digital content from the city website in lieu of traditional in-person workshops.

GOAL 5: Work with the city to reduce excessive water use in city parks, which can lead to a considerable cost savings for the city.

Any additional feedback to share with the City Council?

The sustainability work that needs to be done in the city can lead to money-savings in the future, but that work cannot be accomplished by the SAB as an advisory body, nor by existing city staff members. It needs the dedicated attention of a sustainability staff person. This should be a priority for the city council in 2021.

- Determine the responsibilities of the UAB with respect to the anticipated 2023 budget shortfall
- In 2021, should COVID State of Oregon restrictions for open meetings no longer apply, schedule UAB meetings at SFWB and the Tri-City Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- Keep apprised of and provide input to City Council related to the new COWL Water Master Plan.

The UAB will need to coordinate with City Council and City staff utility leadership to explore options for addressing the projected 2023 budget shortfall.
