




Southwest Service Enhancement Plan

At TriMet, we're taking a new look at how transit service can be improved to better serve the changing face of the Portland metro region. We received strong support for our Westside Service Enhancement Plan, and we're conducting a similar planning process for the Southwest area of the region in 2014 and early 2015.



This area includes Southwest Portland, Durham, King City, Lake Oswego, Sherwood, Tigard, Tualatin and West Linn.

A Shared Vision for Southwest transit



The Southwest Service Enhancement Plan will address the demand for more local and regional bus service connecting Southwest communities to jobs, schools and resources throughout the region.

Creating the shared vision involves looking at data, reviewing plans for neighborhood and business growth, considering community investments, and evaluating changes in populations and equity needs. To learn as much as we can, we are holding conversations with riders, local governments, employers, neighborhoods and community groups, and we invite you to share your thoughts with us through community meetings and online channels.

Outcomes

The Southwest Service Enhancement Plan will identify areas for future service, as well as opportunities to partner with governments and businesses for access to transit improvements. The process will identify:

- Ways to support the land-use plans developed by jurisdictions in the Southwest Corridor Plan study area (see below).
- Near-term bus service improvements that can be made soon with modest cost.
- Long-term bus service improvements to implement over time.
- Partnerships with cities, the county, and businesses to improve access to bus and light rail stops.



Timeline

- **Fall 2013** – Public feedback and data collection
- **Spring 2014** – Draft vision for bus service improvements
- **Summer 2014** – Public feedback on draft vision
- **Early Fall 2014** – Refine vision
- **Late Fall 2014/Early Winter 2015** – Public feedback on refined vision
- **Winter 2015** – Finalize vision

Related project: Southwest Corridor Plan



The SW Corridor Plan began with local land use plans to identify actions that sup-

port vibrant communities. Building on the local plans, the Southwest Corridor Plan examines high capacity transit alternatives and potential roadway, bicycle and pedestrian improvements. The plan identifies actions and investments that support key elements of a successful region, such as healthy communities, economic prosperity, transportation choices, clean air and water, and equity.
