**Science Zone** (grades 3-5) on Wednesday, October 24th from 1:30 – 2:30pm. Early Release day. Hands-on science fun!



## Cricket in the Thicket by Carol Murray

This is a sweet, whimsical nonfiction picture poetry book about bugs.
Caldecott-winning artist Melissa
Sweet's collage art perfectly captures each poem's rhythmic text.
Additional facts about each creature are included on each spread.





# How to Survive As A Shark by Kristen Foote

This hilarious nonfiction picture book about sharks is both entertaining and educational. Facts are hidden throughout the silly story, enticing children to continue reading. A companion, *How to Survive as a Firefly*, is also available.





#### The Girl Who Drew Butterflies: How Maria Merian's Art Changed Science by Joyce Sidman

The fascinating illustrated biography of a girl who used art and investigation to explore the natural world. And she did it in a time and place where girls were not expected to be either scientists or artists: 17th century Germany.



#### Escargot by Dashka Slater

A charming read about a typically not-socharming animal who doesn't want to eat her vegetables. The simple, detailed illustrations (French sailor's shirt, neckerchief and beret for Escargot) are très chic, and encourage reading this witty book with a French accent.



#### Peter and Ernesto: A Tale of Two Sloths by Graham Annable

Two sloths live a dull and happy life until one of them decides it's time for an adventure. A fun and funny graphic novel that's also a good choice for kids moving up from early readers.



# Front Desk by Kelly Yang

Mia's family has just moved from China to the U. S. Her attempts to adjust, and to help her parents adjust, are funny and insightful. It's set in the early 1990's, but her experiences will resonate with kids 25 years later.



## The Sandcastle that Lola Built by Megan Maynor

This modern spin on *The House*That Jack Built is a playful read with patterns kids can predict.
Most importantly, the children are diverse and the theme is around inclusion, friendship, and resilience.



### In the Past by David Elliott

Short poems about dinosaurs and other prehistoric creatures, with eye-catching drawings of the animals in action. Humor, science, art, and poetry mixed together on a popular topic.



## Bob by Wendy Mass and Rebecca Stead

Two accomplished children's authors combine their talents to tell of a girl named Livie and the creature who lives in her grandmother's closet that looks like "a small zombie wearing a chicken suit." Mysterious, funny, and thought-provoking.
