More Than Peach by Bellen Woodard



Flipping Forward Twisting Backward


by Alma Fullerton




New From Here by Kelly Yang

An important and touching story from the author of *Front Desk* that weaves themes of family separation, the pandemic, and moving to a new country, with anti-Asian racism addressed in gentle yet powerful ways. Based on the award-winning author's lived experience.



Laverne Cox by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara The latest title from the beloved Little People, Big Dreams picture book biography series for young readers shares the story of an accomplished actress and the first transgender person to be nominated for an Emmy. An inspiring story of living life as your true self.




A History of Me by Adrea Theodore A simple story of not being seen for who you are, but instead for the label everyone has been taught that you are. It is also the experience of a Black child influenced by storytelling and history, revealing the fortitude and resilience of her ancestors. Important!



Honestly Elliott by Gillian McDunn

When a friendship develops because of the honesty shared about the challenges they've each been dealt, two kids are forever changed. A story that gives voice to a child living with ADHD, unlikely companions, and family dynamics.



If You're A Kid Like Gavin by Gavin Grimm and Kyle Lukoff

Vibrantly illustrated, this picture book biography shares the story of a young transgender student who fought for what he believed in. A glimpse into the courage behind the landmark supreme court bathroom case and the victory for transgender rights.
