A blind French girl on the run from the German occupation and a German orphan-turned-Resistance tracker struggle with their respective beliefs after meeting on the Brittany coast. [France]




The Book of Lost Names

Reunited when the elder's husband is sent to fight in World War II, French sisters Vianne and Isabelle find their bond as well as their respective beliefs tested by a world that changes in horrific ways. [France]

Our Darkest Night

by Jennifer Robson (Fiction)

Hiding from the Nazis in the guise of a Christian farmer's wife, a Jewish woman is met with suspicion by a Nazi official who harbors a vendetta against the former seminary student posing as her husband. [Italy]

The Librarian of Auschwitz by Antonio Iturbe; translated by Lilit Žekulin Thwaites (Fiction)
Follows the true story of Dita Kraus, a fourteenyear-old girl from Prague who after being sent to Auschwitz is chosen to protect the eight volumes prisoners have smuggled past the guards.



The Tattooist of Auschwitz by Heather Morris (Fiction)
An Auschwitz-Birkenau survivor traces the experiences of a Jewish Slovakian, Lale Sokolov, who uses his position as a concentration-camp tattooist to secure food for his fellow prisoners.



We Were the Lucky Ones
by Georgia Hunter (Fiction)
A novel based on the true
story of a Jewish-Polish
family recounts how the
Kurcs are scattered
throughout the world by
the horrors of World War II
and fight respective
