A LIB-CON SUMMARY

ENJOY GRAPHIC NOVELS (SERIOUSLY!) SARA CHESNEY" YOUTUBE TRANSCRIPT

Hello, my name is Sara Chesney, and I am an Adult services Librarian here at the West Linn Public Library. I want to welcome you to our second annual library comic con event. Last year my wonderful colleague Kimberley Rhoades gave the opening remarks on why its important to let children choose graphic novels, a link to that video is featured in the description below. Today, I'm here to give a voice to the merits of graphic novels in order to give you permission to enjoy reading them at any age.

As a librarian, I frequently hear disparaging comments about GNs because they are not considered real literature. With the proliferation of graphic novel adaptations of classics, including works by Jane Austen, Shakespeare, Orson Wells, Harper Lee, even the tale of genji, the argument that GNs are not real literature is losing its foundation. There are those that equate time reading with literary value, without recognizing how quickly our fabulous minds can extract information from a single panel such as a characters appearance and their emotions, their place in their environment, and their interaction with those around them. Then there's this perception that once we get to a certain age we are no longer allowed to enjoy illustrations in literature, that we are not allowed to enjoy the hundreds of hours it takes to write, storyboard, edit, draw, and publish a graphic novel.

Graphic novels, can do so much. They are a tool for Social-emotional learning, and help readers develop self-awareness, self-management, social awareness and empathy, relationship skills, and responsible decision making. When combined with other forms of literature, they help literacy rates as GNs tend to use more advanced and unique words than novels. Graphic novels are an important medium for promoting diversity. Graphic novels are an important medium for promoting diversity they're both a window and a mirror and help readers appreciate the differences in cultures ethnicities abilities even our appearances everything that makes up the complexities of life

With an art history background, what I think is interesting about graphics novels is that they are frequently overlooked as a great tool for teaching art, art history, and promoting an appreciation of the arts. Let's disregard the obvious biographical graphic novels on artists such as Gaugin, and Andy Worhol. Let's also ignore the fabulous Manga, Blue Period, which literally teaches art principles and design. Graphic novels encourages readers to understand how art can be used to tell a story. Is there a reason why an illustrator chose to implement clean lines compared to frantic marks? How does the use of color, or lack thereof, help to set the tone or the scene of the story? What does the style of the artwork say about the story? You might notice that these are the same questions we ask ourselves while admiring the works in our art museum, yet this is accessible in our day to day lives and the impact should not be ignored.

Despite all these fabulous reasons to read graphics novels, the one point that I want to end with is that reading should be fun. Quite frequently I will be approached by an adult believing that they should be reading "real literature." That the only reason they can justify the hobby of reading is by reading a certain type of book, and that forcing themselves to read said book will somehow help them get back into reading. Unsurprisingly, this method always fails. At the library we are here to foster a lifetime love of reading, and for many that includes graphic novels. You can still find the genre you love, mystery, romance, scifi, fantasy, horror, biographies, history, cooking, there's something for everyone. This may even introduce you to the new genres you didn't know you'd love. They are quick to read, so if you're feeling down about not reaching this year's reading goal, they're fabulous to go to.



For Spaghetti

Put water on to boil and add some salt.

Cut pancetta into pieces about the size of a dime.

Cook garlic in oil and butter 'till golden. Then "discard" cloves (or eat them on toast!

Cook the pancetta in the hot, garlicy oil/ butter. Once the pancetta is cooked, add the wine. Try to control your drool long enough to reduce the mixture for about 2 min. Try not to eat all of the pancetta outta the pan. Just try.

Add spaghetti to boiling water and cook until tender but firm.

Break eggs into bowl. Scramble with parsley, peppers, and both cheeses. Add hot drained pasta to the egg mix and stir it up. The heat from the pasta will cook the eggs and bind the noodles with the cheese, parsley, and peppers.

Stir in the pancetta and serve. Pro tip: I like to add peas. (About a cup, fresh or frozen)




MIRA


















STARCROSS (an indie webtoon)

Vambrace Tutorial

Introduction:

EVA foam is an amazing material - it's the stuff that makes yoga mats, anti-fatigue workshop mats and craft foam. EVA foam is such a great material because it is cheap, easy to work with and with a little ingenuity, can be transformed into just about anything. The tutorial that follows outlines how to use EVA foam to create awesome cosplay armor.

Tools:

- Pencil/Pen
- Ruler
- Utility Knife
- Cutting Board
- Hot glue gun
- Heat gun
- Paint Brushes



Materials:


- 12x18 sheet of 5mm craft foam (thick)
- 12x18 sheet of 2mm craft foam (thin)
- (2) hot glue sticks
- Mod Podge
- Misc. acrylic paints



Please read these directions carefully before/during your work. You are welcome to practice artistic license, however, the process you follow to create your prop needs to be as outlined in this tutorial.



Vambrace Pattern





Vambrace Directions

Step 1: Begin with the pattern (See page 12)

 Always begin with a pattern. A pattern is a flat template or outline that is used to design the final product. Using the pattern outline provided, draw a design for your vambrace.

Step 2: Cut out the paper pattern.

• Once your ideas are planned and patterned out, you are ready to begin fabricating. Cut out the paper vambrace pattern.

Step 3: Trace the pattern and cut the foam pieces

- Trace the vambrace pattern onto thick (5mm) craft foam. Next, trace the smaller pieces onto thin (2mm) craft foam,. These are the details that you want to stand out on your vambrace.
- When all pattern pieces are traced onto craft foam, cut them out. Use a cutting board and sharp utility knife. Cut away from your body, with the blade straight down into the foam.

Step 4: Fabrication - sculpt and build armor.

- EVA foam is sculptable when heated. Find a safe place to work away from people and anything that can melt. Use the heat gun to warm your largest piece by passing the heat gun back and forth across the foam surface. Caution: too much heat and the foam will melt.
- When the EVA foam is warm to the touch, turn off the heat gun and quickly shape the EVA foam. Do not press hot EVA foam against bare skin. Hold the foam in place until it cools completely. Repeat this process for any other pieces that need to hold a specific shape.

Step 5: Glue the armor pieces together.

• Using hot glue, follow your pattern to create your vambrace.

Step 6: Sand the edges smooth.

• Use sandpaper to clean up any rough edges or seams. Start with coarse sandpaper followed by medium and fine sandpaper.

Step 7: Seal and prime the foam with modpodge.

 Apply 3-4 coats of mod podge to the outside of your vambrace. Cover everything. Avoid leaving brush strokes and fingerprints. The mod podge must dry completely between each coat, and 24 hours after the last layer. Clean all your brushes during this process - mod podge will destroy paint brushes if left to dry.

Step 8: Paint your vambrace with acrylic paint.

• Use multiple layers of acrylic paint to create your design. Allow 24 hours to dry.

Step 9: Seal the paint.

 Aerosol paints contain a lot of chemicals - spray your vambrace outside in a well ventilated area. Shake the can for 1 minute before you spray. Spray 8-10 inches away from your piece in sweeping motions. Allow your vambrace 24 hours to dry.

Step 10: Add D-Rings

• To wear the armor, you need to use D-rings. Hot glue 4 D-ring attachments to each vambrace. Use string to attach the vambraces to your body.





COMIC BOOK Coasters

Ingredients needed:

- Ceramic tile(s)
- Modge Podge adhesive (marked #1)
- · Cork sheet
- · Comic book pages
- Polycrylic clear finish (marked #2)
- · Sponge brush
- (Optional) paint brush not included
- · Scissors not included





Instructions:

- 1. Cut out comic book image, using cork sheet as a size-guide. (4 in x 4 in)
- 2. Using the sponge brush, apply a medium layer of Modge Podge to the blank tile. (Both the Modge Podge and the Polycrylic appear white in liquid form. Once dry, both will be clear.)
- 3. Place image on tile and gently center. Make sure to smooth out any bubbles! Let dry for 15-20 minutes. (Rinse out sponge brush or rest it in a cup of water!)

Instructions contd.

- 4. Apply a medium layer of Modge Podge over image and tile. Let dry 15-20 minutes again. Thoroughly rinse out sponge brush. Blot brush
- 5. Apply a thin layer of Polycrylic finish. Let dry for 2 hours. (For smoother finish, use a paint brush.) This will give your tile a nice glossy finish AND protect your image from heat and condensation.
- 6. Apply 2nd layer of Polycylic. Let dry for 2 hours.
- 7. Apply 3rd and final layer of Polycrylic to your tile. Let dry for 3 hours.
- 8. Once dry, affix the cork sheet to the bottom of the tile. This will protect your surfaces from the scratchy tile. You're done!
