Subject: Salvage Procedures for Historic Homes

In a January 22, 2009 discussion with Joy Sears of Oregon State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) it was learned that SHPO has no formal procedures or requirements regarding salvage operations. Ms. Sears asked if we had created our own procedures. I stated that a search of the internet had produced some suggestions.

One site used by the US Army Corps of Engineers entitled "Removal and Salvage of Historic Building Materials" recommended a tour of the house by staff assisted by qualified individuals to identify features appropriate for salvage. Taking photographs and notes would assist in this inventory. They also offered a non exclusive list of items typically appropriate for salvage including:

fences
gates
precast architectural elements
masonry
brick
stone
fireplace and brazier
cast stone
terra cotta
stairs and handrails
architectural metalwork
millwork
custom paneling
wood stairs

handrails wood timbers dimensional lumber slate tiles gutters and downspouts kitcken and bathroom tile work exterior siding doors and door knobs windows glass stenciling decorative finishes wood flooring light fixtures latches light switch plates metal hardware for doors, cupboards etc mirrors toilet and sink fixtures radiators, registers and grilles ceiling coverings (pressed metal) other items of historic or architectural value

- Salvage priority would be given to West Linn residents of Historic Homes and Landmarks first, followed by other West Linn residents and then non-West Linn residents.
- There is the issue of policing the site during the salvage operation and liability for the city. Both of those concerns argue in favor of having the house only open to the public for supervised inspection and identification of desirable salvage material on one Saturday morning and then making it available for removal of that material either in that same afternoon, the next day (Sunday) or on the following Saturday morning. Supervision required at all times.
- A waiver should be prepared for signature by members of the public so they may
 accept personal responsibility and indemnify the city against any accident on the
 property or claims regarding the quality and structural integrity of the salvaged
 products.
- If the removal of this material is not fully accomplished by West Linn residents for the restoration of their own historic homes, then we may want to contact Portland's Deconstructive Services. This company specializes in salvaging material at demolition sites, particularly old homes. They would be an ideal resource to finish the salvage project after residents have had their opportunity.
