Golf carts: Steve Fearing suggests an ordinance to allow Low Speed Vehicles (LSV) on designated city streets. He presented a Draft Model Ordinance.

These have been allowed in the past but an ordinance is suggested for clarification. Mr. Fearing presented a detailed letter describing LSV use in other Oregon communities as a transportation option with many positive aspects. He is hoping for endorsement from the WNA. One comment of support came from a Zoom participant

NAMI National Alliance in Mental Illness: Gary Marchke, a spokesman for NAMI, presented flyers and information on resources for mental health support in Clackamas County. Among causes are:

^{*}anxiety, depression, stress, trauma

^{*}stress in the workplace, in jails and prisons, in schools

*associated with other disease

A suicidal person may be experiencing a stress emergency with little or no warning. A person wishing to help should encourage this person to talk, describe his pain and be encouraged to talk to a professional. Police departments have such contacts. Do not attempt to solve the problem but urge intervention. Stay with person until help arrives.

Some signs to look for are: agitation, erratic behavior, depression, odd comments. The NAMI works to dispel the stigma of this illness.

988 is the emergency number to call for help and local resources.

Comments:

Should the WNA purchase more meeting signs? Are these signs effective?

It is suggested that stronger supports are needed because signs blow over easily. 10 double sided signs are \$31.60 each.

A brief discussion addressed WNA successes and challenges in 2025. A list will be printed up as the WNA annual report to the City.

Land use:

A resident on 11th street questioned a proposed lot division at 1315 11th for 8 to 10 townhouses. Because this falls under the heading of "middle housing", the planning director makes these decisions. Adjacent residents worry that 2+ story houses will shadow gardens and cut out light and views. The profile of tall townhouses would not be compatible with existing houses. The audience offered advice.
